HUMANITARIAN PROJECTS COMPLETED IN NEPAL

The Friends of the Himalayas and Altrusa International Club of Montrose are grateful to have recently completed a joint project in the remote village of Riku in the Rolwaling district of Nepal. There was a great need for a central community toilet structure in Riku. The two organizations jointly funded the purchase and transportation of materials, and, with the enthusiastic cooperation of the residents who furnished the volunteer labor, under the skilled directions of a stonemason, successfully built a double (men's and women's) facility. The toilets consist of stone walls, wooden doors, a concrete floor with ceramic inserts and water faucets for cleansing. Thank you to Pasang Kitar for his oversight and accountability for the project, and Danika Gilbert for her research. A brass plate recognizes Altrusa and WCFH for their much welcomed contribution to village amenities.

Simagau in the Rolwaling region of Nepal is a remote rural village of which one small cluster of houses is separated from the main area by rugged terrain and, lacking any water source, the residents' daily chore was to haul water from the main village to their distant homes. Water for drinking, cooking, bathing, and cleaning.

Western Colorado Friends of the Himalayas organization relayed funds to a trusted representative to purchase and transport pipe, cement powder and plumbing fixtures. The villagers supplied their voluntary labor to install the pipe from the hydro, build a water trough and install the parts. Now they have their own running water linked to the main source. The families are very appreciative of this time and labor saving asset to their community.

CENTER FOR DISABLED ADULTS IN KATHMANDU

An independent facility for disabled, wheelchair bound men and women was rescued from a dire threat of closure and abandonment when WCFH learned of their lack of funds to buy basic foods and prescription medicines. Covid had prevented the residents from selling their handmade craft products due to restrictions and the lack of tourists, thus losing their major source of funding. Having their authenticity verified by friends in Kathmandu, WCFH provided emergency welfare relief funds which the residents gratefully acknowledged with photos and messages. Recent travelers returning from Nepal have transported their meticulously crafted, attractive boiled sheep's wool (felt) items (including elephants, pixies, dogs, flowers, and coin purses) which WCFH members have had the pleasure of selling locally to supplement the funds which sustain the home and its residents.







BILL DUCKWORTH SCHOLARSHIP FUND

The Bill Duckworth Scholarship Committee is pleased to announce four grants for a total amount of \$2700, awarded to students in Nepal, who have completed their high school education and are enrolling in higher education programs. Congratulations to the recipients, Pemba Jamgmu Sherpa, Mingma Dolma Sherpa, Saka Futi Sherpa and Sanjit Rai.

FAMILY RELIEF FUND

A new Family Relief Fund has given a \$500 grant to a recently widowed mother of two children, whose husband was accidentally electrocuted, and a \$1200 grant to a young woman in great need to provide support for her education in Kathmandu. This Family Relief Fund is being supported by Karsang Sherpa through the Western Colorado Friends of the Himalayas.



NEW 2022 PROJECT – THE PARAHU LEARNING CENTER

The Parahu "Let's Study" Learning Center in a poverty stricken region of the Terai in Southern Nepal, serves 280 children of the Musahar population. Financial support will provide school, educational, arts & crafts supplies and sports equipment. The grant will also furnish a sound system and dance supplies to foster preservation of their culture.
